When Robert Champ, Cameron, was asked about the Marvin Millsap Sigma Tau Gamma Headquarters Decommissioning Ceremony, those were just a few words of his emotional and thoughtful response.

On the first Saturday in November, the Sigma Tau Gamma Board of Directors, along with the HQ Staff, hosted the official Decommissioning Ceremony of the Marvin Millsap Sigma Tau Gamma Headquarters.

Many people attended the ceremony, including past professional staff, current undergraduates, and Golden Chain of Honor members. CEO Emeritus Bill Bernier, Kent State, served as the emcee for the event and shared his thoughts on the history of 101 Ming Street.

"It is bittersweet to be standing here with you for this occasion," Bernier said. "Nearly 50 years ago in August 1968, Founder Emmett Ellis journeyed from Warrensburg to Milwaukee for the 23rd Grand Chapter. There he appealed to the delegates to move the Sigma Tau Gamma Headquarters from rented space in Webster Groves, MO, to a permanent headquarters on the Founding Site in Warrensburg. They agreed."

As the cool, crisp evening came to a close in Warrensburg on November 4, all in attendance had one final toast to the Marvin Millsap Sigma Tau Gamma Headquarters Building.

BROTHERS LEARN TO LEAD AT NOBLE MAN INSTITUTE

During the second weekend of November, over 150 new members from across the nation packed their bags and hit the road to one of four locations for the second annual Noble Man Institute. The four locations that were offered this year were Deckers, Colorado; Hardwick, New Jersey; Carlinville, Illinois; and Ellijay, Georgia.

The weather was a bit colder than what attendees had been hoping for, but they enjoyed themselves nonetheless. New members participated in regular discussions about values



and leadership, evaluated the six Principles in depth, and even got the chance to face their fear of heights with zip lines and high ropes challenges. Alumni also attended a portion of the program where new members got the opportunity to hear about the Alumni experience and what it means to be involved with Sig Tau in the years after graduation.

SIG TAU SETS RECORD FOR FALL RECRUITMENT NUMBERS

As the 2017 fall semester comes to a close, the men of Sigma Tau Gamma have succeeded in setting a new recruitment record. This fall 910 Noble Men were recruited into the Brotherhood. This surpasses numbers from the previous fall by more than 100 new brothers.

As our fraternity grows and recruits larger numbers of men, ChapterBuilder has been a key component to successful recruitment. Currently 71 percent of our chapters are using ChapterBuilder, and more than half of the chapters have an alumni coach helping them through the recruitment process with ChapterBuilder.
