Q&A WITH TRENT ELDER, DIRECTOR OF RECRUITMENT FOR SOUTHEAST MISSOURI STATE

The Alpha Phi Chapter at Southeast Missouri saw a very successful recruitment this past fall. Nineteen men accepted bids from the Alpha Phi Chapter, which almost doubled the size of their chapter.

Q: Can you tell me about your process for recruitment and why you think you were so successful?

A: Basically, what we did was start on move-in day. Two other guys and I went to the move-in day bash and got many of the new students' information. We had a table set up with some of our chapter's awards and honors, our flag, as well as my computer to collect contact information. This gave us a base list of about 120 names to connect with as potential new members. It was a great way to give new students a chance to hear of Sigma Tau Gamma first.

Q: How did you involve the other chapter members?

A: I broke the chapter into groups of 4-5 people and gave each group a list of potential new members to contact and inform them of recruitment events, and tell them who we are. We didn't want to leave anyone out. That was a good starter. After that, we just did our thing, and it worked out.

Q: What kind of events did you hold?

A: The first day that recruitment opened we essentially had a meet-and-greet, had some pizza, played darts, and hung out. We went to the gym on campus and played some pickup basketball games a few times. We also went out to dinner, played pool, and hung out with brothers and potential new members. The university hosts information nights as well. Then on the last night, we had a more formal dinner right before we extended bids. For dinner, we brought in our Chapter Advisor and Alumni Advisor and all of our active brothers. Our Alumni Advisor and Chapter Advisor discussed what it means to be a Sig Tau with the men.

Q: What is your number one piece of advice for other chapters who want to follow in your footsteps?

A: The biggest thing is to make sure that no one falls through the cracks. It's so easy for guys to get lost in the crowd. Also, making sure I was organized and making sure each potential new member was getting contacted and getting all the information was huge. I made sure that everyone was doing their job and that I held the active members accountable.

Q: How many bids you did extend?

A: We extended around 30 bids, so more than half accepted.








AROUND THE CHAIN OF HONOR





TAILGATING AND FOOTBALL SEASON

There is nothing quite like the smell of the grill, the crisp air, and the roar of fans during college football season. Sig Tau brothers and fans around the country gather together each weekend to cheer on their teams, celebrate the experience, and to continue their tailgating traditions.

To cheer on the Crimson Tide at The University of Alabama, the Epsilon Phi Chapter loves to get together and tailgate. According to Chapter President Nathan Dickerson, the chapter "cater[s] food every weekend--usually BBQ or something similar. We put up a few tents and a TV or two to watch the games during the day. We hang out and play yard games like cornhole."

The Epsilon Psi Chapter at Oklahoma State similarly celebrates their game days. Chapter President Jenner Brown shared that tailgating is a very big deal at OSU. The chapter hosts their tailgate near the stadium, which takes about five minutes by foot. "Depending on the game time, we will set up a tailgate anywhere from 3-5 hours before the start of the game for members, alumni, friends, and family to attend," Brown said. "We have a couple of big canopy tents that we set up, have a big grill, which we cook hamburgers, hot dogs, links, and anything else people bring."

In addition to grilling and eating, the Epsilon Psi chapter also brings a generator to watch other football games. While tailgating, they bring footballs, frisbees, cornhole, and other lawn games to play as well. Brown said that tailgating continues during the entirety of the game, and many people will rejoin during halftime to grill and hang out.

"After each game is concluded, some of us guys will go eat out together somewhere, and then head back to somebody's house to finish watching the other football games for the night," Brown stated. "It is always an all-day affair when it comes to football game days on Saturdays here in Stillwater."
