

## EARL A. WEBB ACADEMY FOR PRINCIPLED LEADERS

Sigma Tau Gamma was the first national fraternity to hold a President's conference, then known as Chapter President's Boot Camp. Since the first boot camp in 1985, now known as the Earl A. Webb Academy for Principled Leaders, the leadership program has evolved and now includes four-chapter officers. The purpose has remained the same: to provide time and space for brothers to become effective leaders for their chapters, develop personal and officer goals, and to design a framework for chapter success. This three-day program of intense leadership training and networking with other undergraduate officers, university professionals, Fraternity volunteers, and Headquarters Staff concentrates on personal and chapter leadership.



## **NOBLE MAN INSTITUTE**

Noble Man Institute is designed specifically for the newest members of Sig Tau – the future leaders of our chapters and campuses. Since its inception in 2016, the retreat-based, substance-free format lends itself to a program that is hosted in a camp setting, utilizes large and small group curriculum presentation, peer-led facilitation, ropes challenge courses, family-style meals, an evening campfire and an alumni panel.

## **FUTURE PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT**

We must continue to offer the best development opportunities possible for undergraduate leaders by providing opportunities for more students to connect, learn, and grow.

In the last few years, Noble Man Institute was introduced, and Webb Academy has undergone tremendous growth. Throughout the next biennium, the Path of Principles Program will also be undergoing significant changes. The member education program will be multi-faceted and will focus on education throughout the entire undergraduate experience, not just as a new member. A member education committee has already begun work on the creation of the program and is working on a phased rollout over the next two years.

As Sigma Tau Gamma continues to grow, we strive for Noble Man Institute to be an experience attended by every new member. The long-term goal is to endow this program, providing the opportunity for every new brother to attend the program free of charge.

Similarly, there is an opportunity to develop the leaders who are teaching the next generation of Sig Taus. Higher caliber training leads to higher caliber leaders. The future of Webb Academy will provide more training opportunities, including virtual training for all executive cabinet officers, the onboarding of more partners in higher education to bring a new level of professionalism, and continuing to show the lifetime commitment to Sig Tau by having Society of the Seventeen attend to share stories of brotherhood with undergraduates.
