The Epsilon Chapter at Pittsburg State hosted its alumni day on Saturday, April 15. Nearly two dozen alumni traveled back to campus to share a meal with current undergraduate brothers, view house updates, and stay updated with an involvement meeting. Epsilon Chapter President Trace Eike, Pittsburg State, wanted the alumni to feel welcomed and to better the relationship with alumni from multiple decades.

"We had alumni from every decade from the 70s through the 2000s attend. Many alumni are located in the greater Kansas City area, so making the two-hour drive to spend the afternoon with the chapter would be a good way to connect and better our relationship with alumni."



The day started with a barbeque hosted by the chapter and sharing brotherhood stories through the decades; it then transitioned to the alumni meeting, where Eike was able to give an update about what the chapter has accomplished since he became chapter president and a house tour of updates that have happened this academic year.

"We've painted the first floor, hung new décor and fraternity memorabilia on the walls, renovated the first floor bathrooms, installed new landscaping out front, and also painted multiple rooms on the second floor," Eike said.
