LETTER FROM THE CEO



Brothers and Friends:

I drafted this letter to you on the 4th of July, the end of my first official week as the 9th CEO of Sigma Tau Gamma Fraternity. Serving in this role is the honor of a lifetime, and I'm excited to share some of my early thoughts with you.

First, very little is achieved entirely on one's own. Certainly not the management of the Fraternity! In the past few months, as I have been preparing for the transition, my own capacity for gratitude has increased tremendously. Many of us have friends, family, co-workers, and Fraternity brothers supporting us throughout our lives. I certainly do. Recently, I have found myself especially aware of them and deeply grateful for their presence.

Taking time to realize how much support one has can feel like turning on a light in a dark room, revealing that your supporters have been there the whole time. I encourage our alumni, student members, and especially chapter officers to take a moment to consider this, turn on the light, bask in the support of your brothers and family, and show them appropriate appreciation. Helpfulness often comes naturally to us, but asking for help and appreciating those who give it can take more courage.

I am especially thankful for our outgoing CEO, Buz Barlow, and Sigma Tau Gamma's 5th CEO and my mentor, the late Bill Bernier. Buz's recent leadership of Sig Tau, and Bill's investment in me as a mentor, are critical to my success and to our success as a Fraternity. Thank you, brothers.

Next, I want to share a message I sent to our Headquarters staff during the week of July 4th, before our office closed for the holiday:

As we celebrate America's independence this weekend, I am reminded of a speech I once heard about fraternities as a training ground for society's future leaders. America needs men to exercise leadership, citizenship, integrity, and excellence to help us move forward as a nation. Our chapters are a training ground for these skills. IN 1927, delegates to the third Conclave in Emporia, Kansas created the position of Executive Secretary. Thomas Hutsell of Beta Chapter was appointed to serve in this role and became our first CEO, charged with managing the Fraternity's records and promoting expansion of new chapters.

With his appointment by the Fraternity Board of Directors, Addison now follows in the footsteps of eight predecessors, charged with the overall welfare and growth of Sigma Tau Gamma.

What is your story of joining Sigma Tau Gamma?

My dad, a fraternity man and mentor, inspired me to join Greek life at Truman State. I explored several fraternities, but Beta Chapter's fellowship and brotherhood immediately stood out.

How were you involved in Beta Chapter?

I wasn't a chapter officer. Some men join for leadership or professional development, but I joined primarily for friendship. My best memories are spending time at the house with brothers. I also served as an IFC officer, NPHC step show host, and Greek Week co-executive director, and made great friends across other fraternities and sororities.

What did you do after graduating from Truman State?

Soon after graduating, I joined the Fraternity's staff under Clint McCurry and Bill Bernier. From 2008–2014, I visited nearly every chapter, restarted Kappa at UW Whitewater, Delta Alpha at East Carolina, and Beta lota at Penn West–California, and helped launch award-winning chapters like UNC Charlotte and Alabama. We strengthened recruitment, reduced debt, built the expansion program, and began our Special Olympics partnership.

After six years as a Headquarters staff member, what came next?

I left for OmegaFi, having already helped chapters implement their financial and data tools. I saw firsthand how these systems could grow budgets, improve accountability, and strengthen data management. Over 11 years, I worked with other fraternities on similar programs, joined the executive team as Vice President of Sales, represented the company at industry events, developed training materials, and learned the business side of our industry.



Did you stay involved with Sig Tau?

Yes. I advised Auburn's chapter, helping them intentionally build a budget to secure and move into their first house. Later, I served on the WPN Board of Managers. I also stayed close with brothers and started an annual trip with Mike Ray, Paul Manly, Derek Kaimann, and Josh Floyd—Sig Taus from different chapters—where we visit a new city each year.



What about life outside the Fraternity?

I married my husband Matthew, rescued our dog Buddy the Sidekick, and even traveled the country for 18 months in a camper.

How did you become CEO?

When the CEO position opened in 2025, I applied and was honored to be selected. I trained with Buz Barlow and other leaders before officially starting July 1. One of my favorite moments was calling Bill Bernier, the 5th CEO and my mentor as a young staffer, to share the news.

What's next?

For now, we are working toward four strategic priorities in our "Raising the Sails" plan:

- 1) SIGMA TAU GAMMA IS A GROWING FRATERNITY,
- 2 WITH STABLE FINANCES,
- 3 A UNIQUE AND COMPELLING MEMBER EXPERIENCE,
- 4) AND GREAT CHAPTERS.

This summer, staff developed plans to meet these goals. We launched a new recruitment system to support chapters and will soon announce a volunteer program for alumni. Awards and chapter standards are being updated to better align with chapter success and greatness. We're committed to helping Sigma Tau Gamma thrive and provide value to its members. These priorities guide everything we do as we lay the foundation for a strong and sustainable future.

Any final thoughts?

Yes, as I said in my letter, I'm grateful and honored to be here. When you join a fraternity, you don't really imagine it can be your job when you graduate. But some of us are lucky enough for that to be true. Thank you to everyone that has been involved in helping our Noble Men succeed and Endeavor Forward.



CHAPTER SERVICE PLAN

Sigma Tau Gamma's purpose calls us to always Endeavor Forward. To support this, our 2025-2026 operating plan, "Raising the Sails", focuses on four priorities:

- 1. Sigma Tau Gamma is a Growing Fraternity,
- 2. With Stable Finances.
- 3. A Unique and Compelling Member Experience,
- 4. And Great Chapters.

When these four are true, Sigma Tau Gamma is successful. This year, we're focusing especially on priority four: great chapters.

Our goal is simple: chapter coaching and evaluation programs must effectively and consistently **improve** chapter performance.

This means:

Coaching is purposeful, not just a formality.

Evaluation tools like chapter standards and awards help chapters succeed, not just reward high performers.

We need more staff and volunteers dedicated to chapter coaching and support.

For example, the current annual "Chapter Standards Report" is completed once a year by officers who may not have served the full year, limiting its impact. We are exploring monthly coaching calls to address recruitment, finances, member safety, and programming more consistently. This approach aims to be more effective and less burdensome.

Our investments in chapter success include:

- Adding a third full-time staff member to the chapter success team.
- Launching an integrated recruitment system to help chapters grow.

- Rebuilding an alumni volunteer network focused on chapter advising and coaching.
- Expanding fundraising staff to support educational programs like Webb Academy and Noble Man Institute.
- Seeking grants to create chapter officer manuals and an online knowledge base.
- Developing a chapter health dashboard to identify issues early.
- Inviting chapter leaders to provide feedback at Board meetings, helping shape the definition of a "great chapter."
- Building an alumni association program for organized mentorship.

Why emphasize great chapters?


Because well-run chapters provide the best member experience and produce generations of Noble Men. Strong chapters recruit the best men, manage finances well, keep members safe, support housing, and raise funds for causes like Special Olympics. Research shows great chapters lead to better grades, retention, and graduation rates.


By the time you read this, many initiatives will be underway. Chapters spent the summer preparing recruitment plans and learning updated standards.

Chapters need a strong Fraternity to succeed, and the Fraternity depends on great chapters. Together with university and alumni partners, this partnership is vital for Sigma Tau Gamma's future.

A year from now, when asked how Sig Tau is doing, I hope to say we are a growing Fraternity, with stable finances, a unique member experience, and, most importantly, great chapters!







For more than four decades, he shaped Sigma Tau Gamma's growth, guiding generations of brothers with steady leadership, profound insight, and an unwavering commitment to Fraternity ideals. His influence is woven into the fabric of the organization, and his example remains a guiding light for brothers to follow.

Bill's journey began as a student at Kent State University in the late 1960s, a time of cultural change and campus unrest. It was there that his dedication to principled brotherhood quickly became evident to all who met him. His calm, reasoned approach to leadership stood out in an era when tempers often flared. That temperament, combined with an unshakable belief in the values of Sigma Tau Gamma, would later define his career.

His tenure as Sigma Tau Gamma's fifth Chief Executive Officer lasted nearly 42 years, the longest in Greek-letter history at the time. Under his guidance, more than 35,000 new members were initiated, 51 chapters were chartered, and innovative programs such as the **Path of Principles** and the Earl A. Webb Academy of Principled **Leaders** were launched. Each of these programs reflected his belief that fraternity is not merely a social outlet, but a place to learn, grow, and prepare for a life of purpose.

Bill also spearheaded a successful capital campaign to establish the Fraternity's National Headquarters on its founding site in Warrensburg, Missouri. In doing so, he not only honored Sig Tau's roots but also created a lasting home for its future. His vision extended beyond geography — he helped break barriers by expanding Sig Tau's presence into major universities that had once seemed out of reach for a Fraternity with a "teacher's college" pedigree.

BILL KOCH REMEMBERS

WILLIAM F. "BILL" KOCH, TRUMAN STATE, BETA, '66

Former Sigma Tau Gamma Leadership Consultant and Foundation Trustee

"I first met Bill in the fall of 1969," recalls Brother Bill Koch, "when I was sent to Kent State University to evaluate a colony's readiness to recharter lota Chapter."

It was a turbulent time in America. The Vietnam War was raging, and protests swept across college campuses. "On campus during a time of intense Vietnam War protests," Koch remembers, "I was greeted with hostility by some strangers, called a 'pig' and spat upon simply for my appearance. Yet that evening, Bill, his twin brother Bob, and the colony members welcomed me warmly. No hazing or harassment, just genuine brotherhood and respect."

That warm welcome left an impression that lasted decades. "That group's dedication and gentlemanly association made it clear they had the right environment to become Noble Men and true Sig Taus," Koch says. "When I returned a year later for the rechartering, Bill's welcome made me feel as if no time had passed. Our friendship and brotherhood had picked up exactly where it left off and lasted many decades!"

Bill Koch's reflection captures the spirit so many brothers felt in Bill Bernier's presence: a profound sense of welcome, loyalty, and dedicated to brotherhood. Whether on the Kent State campus or during his four decades at the helm of Sigma Tau Gamma, Bill's leadership was built on the foundation of genuine connection and unwavering character. He understood people — not just as members or colleagues, but as individuals with hopes, challenges, and potential.

His family's legacy is equally remarkable. Bill's wife, Wendy stood alongside him as his most important partner in service. She was present at countless events, offering warmth and encouragement to members across the

RECOGNITION

PRESERVING HISTORY AND SERVING THE COMMUNITY

Bill Bernier's passions extended well beyond fraternity leadership to preserving important local history, especially the Warrensburg train depot. Closed to the public from 1972 until its renovation in 1991, the depot's revival was a cause Bernier championed passionately.

As founding director and chair of the Depot Renovation, Preservation, and Maintenance Board, Bernier played a vital role-applying for grants, planning construction, and overseeing the project that led to the depot's reopening in 1992. At the 30-year celebration in 2022, he was honored for 35 years of dedicated service to the board, including time as its president.

Reflecting on the project, Bernier said, "It's hard to believe that 30 years ago, we opened the renovated depot after it had been closed for over 20 years. Rail passengers had no indoor facility and had to stand outside. The place was a mess, boarded up and falling apart."

Today, the Warrensburg Chamber of Commerce operates from the depot, and Bernier was also a past Chamber president. In recognition of his many contributions, former Mayor Jim Kushner proclaimed October 27, 2022, as William P. "Bill" Bernier Day.

Bernier's early career included serving as a Boy Scout executive, reflecting his lifelong commitment to leadership and youth development. He also served as a Johnson County representative on the Pioneer Trails Regional Planning Commission Transportation Advisory Council (TAC) from its start in 2003. His dedication to regional transportation planning earned him great respect among peers.

FEAR LESS

"WHAT IF IT GOES WELL?"

A question most people don't think to ask themselves when faced with a challenging situation. A question the men of Sigma Tau Gamma will think about more often.



speaker at the Earl A. Webb Academy of Principled Leaders in Carmel, Indiana in early January. Darryl was chosen as a speaker to deliver his unique message which encourages audiences to grow in fearlessness by fearing less. Fear drives us to think of everything that could go wrong, but rarely do we choose to combat fear by examining how it can help us, as opposed to hurting us. Fear never goes away, but we can harness it to achieve success and break through the barriers we have allowed fear to create.

The pivotal moment of Darryl's presentation came where the members in attendance were challenged to acknowledge their fears, write them down, and deliver them to the front of the room. Webb Academy was silenced as Darryl began reading the fears out loud. Acknowledging fear is only half the battle. The hard part comes when students are presented with opportunities to overcome their fear or react differently to it, to achieve a different more positive outcome.



At the end of each presentation, Darryl collects every slip of paper with every fear, reads them, and then burns them in his home fire pit. The surprise on this 20 degree evening in Carmel, Indiana, was that a Sigma Tau Gamma-adorned fire pit was burning bright in the dark parking lot of the Renaissance hotel.

Without hesitation, over 200 undergraduates, alumni, program volunteers, Fraternity Headquarters Staff, and guests, made their way outside to take the first step in eliminating their fears.

The paper burned quickly, and the fire soon grew dim, but the Webb Academy attendees were granted levity as they began to conquer their personal fears, as well as the fears of their chapter. 

A KNIGHT OF HEROES

BROTHER SULLIVAN WILL BE HONORED AT CHICAGO CHILDREN'S ADVOCACY CENTER'S 'A NIGHT OF HEROES' EVENT IN RECOGNITION OF HIS DEDICATION AND CONTRIBUTIONS TO ADVANCING CHICAGOCAC'S MISSION.

When I was invited by Sig Tau to share my story, I felt honored and honestly a bit terrified. Sig Tau gave me a foundation of brotherhood at a time when I was just beginning to figure out who I was. Sharing my journey with that same brotherhood, years later, felt like a full-circle moment.

In hopes of supporting other survivors and honoring two organizations that shaped my life, I'm opening up about my journey recovering from sexual abuse.

As a child, I was both sexually assaulted and sexually abused by my older brother and a few years later by a camp counselor. Like many who have suffered sexual assault, I didn't say anything when the abuse occurred. Even now, I struggle to understand why I did not say anything or stop it.

As I got older, my priority was to get out of Syracuse, New York, even after the abuse had stopped, and never look back. When it came time for college, I was focused on escaping the past and proving something to the world and to the people around me: that I was good, that I was worth something, and that I was strong.

In 1991, I began a new chapter of my life as a freshman at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh, PA. At the time, I viewed college as a stepping-stone—something that had to be done to move on to the next part of life. I didn't yet realize how much that period would shape me or how deeply it would stay with me.

During my freshman year, a fellow student asked if I'd considered joining a fraternity. I hadn't, but exploring that idea led me to Sigma Tau Gamma—and a bond with my brothers that lasted far beyond college. There I learned the value of deep, meaningful connection. It opened my eyes to diverse perspectives and showed

me how powerful having a strong, supportive network can be.

I didn't tell anyone until my junior year of college, about 10 years after the abuse. Believe it or not – this was a fast disclosure. Some studies suggest that only about 70% of men ever disclose their experiences, and those who do typically wait an average of 15 to 20 years to share.

I often reflect on what made me decide to disclose my truth at that specific time. I attribute much of it to reaching a point in my life where I finally felt safe and supported by the people around me. This was largely due to my Sigma Tau Gamma brothers.



The brotherhood and the relationships I built during school created a support network that gave me the strength to begin addressing the trauma in my life.

Sig Tau helped me understand that real strength comes from community—and that both the tough times and the joyful ones mean more when you have people to share them with.

When I finally felt comfortable enough to reveal what had happened, I only told a limited number of people, and only parts of what had happened to me. The response from my family, when I opened up, was... well, less than ideal. I don't remember the exact moment I confided in my Fraternity brothers, but every time I have, their response has been overwhelmingly supportive. It speaks volumes about the people they are, as well as the bonds we forged during our time together as brothers. Full support and acceptance—brotherhood first.

Sharing my story was the first step in a long journey of recovery—one that I am still on. I did not receive professional help, either after the abuse or after sharing what happened to me. The disclosure itself was traumatic, and as a result, I withdrew again, bottling everything up. It felt easier to hide the pain than to confront it.

Years later, in my mid-thirties, I walked through the Chicago O'Hare Airport and passed a sign about child sexual abuse awareness. I stopped and stared at it for a while, and maybe for the first time,

I wrapped my head around the idea that what happened to me happens to other people.

Unsure of what to do with this realization, I made a small financial donation to Chicago Children's Advocacy Center (ChicagoCAC). When they received my donation, they called to thank me. That unexpected call introduced me to ChicagoCAC and the incredible people behind it.

ChicagoCAC is where courage meets compassion. They are the city's only nonprofit organization that coordinates the efforts of child protection staff, law enforcement professionals, family advocates, and mental health clinicians under one roof. It's a place where kids who have experienced unthinkable trauma are met not with judgment, but with safety, healing, and hope. The professionals there care deeply about protecting children and breaking the cycle of abuse. For many kids, it's the first place they're truly seen, heard, and believed.





After being introduced to this amazing organization, I wanted to find more ways to support their work and raise awareness. While I couldn't change what had happened to me, I wanted to help prevent it from happening to others and ensure that those impacted by abuse could access the professional help they needed.

For over 15 years, I've supported ChicagoCAC through board service, fundraising, and volunteer work. In 2019, I was honored, though admittedly nervous, to be asked to serve as Board President. While I was open about my abuse, I wasn't ready to speak publicly about it. During two terms of close collaboration, I helped advance the organization's mission and experienced personal growth I hadn't anticipated. While I was helping them, they were unknowingly helping me heal.

Recently, ChicagoCAC approached me to be both a Superhero Award honoree and the keynote speaker at their signature event, A Night of Heroes, this fall. I'm grateful to now speak openly—about my abuse and to raise awareness on behalf of ChicagoCAC. But the thought of speaking in front of a few hundred people still shakes me to my core.

When I shared the news of the award and event with my Sigma Tau Gamma brothers, the response I received was overwhelming. Brothers from across the country pledged to donate to ChicagoCAC and expressed their desire to attend. Thirty years after college, these Noble men are taking time out of their







busy lives to show up in Chicago on a Wednesday night to support me. I'm deeply moved by their support and commitment. It inspires me every day, and I hope to one day repay it.

Now, Sigma Tau Gamma and ChicagoCAC, my two families that have uniquely supported my healing journey, will come together. On the surface, they may seem like two very different organizations, but they're built on the same foundational values. Sig Tau stands for learning, integrity, excellence, leadership, and citizenship—and I see every one of those values in the work ChicagoCAC does. Both believe in standing for something greater than yourself, showing up for others, and creating safe, supportive communities.

Sig Tau built the foundation of who I am; ChicagoCAC gives me the opportunity to put those values into action. Thank you for allowing me to share my story.

Since 1966, the Sigma Tau Gamma Foundation has served as a 501(c)(3) non-profit dedicated to investing in the success of our undergraduate brothers. This designation allows us to receive tax-deductible contributions that fund life-changing educational programs and scholarships. Each year, our Trustees award grants to support leadership development, training opportunities, and academic scholarships, empowering brothers to lead with character and purpose. Together, we carry forward the Fraternity's vision of **BUILDING NOBLE GENERATIONS OF MEN.**

Through the generosity of donors, the Sigma Tau Gamma Foundation provides the Fraternity with resources to deliver life-changing educational and leadership programs. Among them is the Earl A. Webb Academy of Principled Leaders (Webb Academy), where newly elected Chapter Officers gain the skills, confidence, and vision to lead. The Foundation also supports the Noble Man Institute, our newest program designed for brothers who have been initiated for only one to two weeks. Up to 18 dedicated Trustees serve on the Foundation's Board, each approved by the Fraternity's Board of Directors for a three-year term. These leaders are entrusted with raising tax-deductible funds, stewarding investments, and ensuring that resources are directed toward scholarships, leadership development, and fostering citizenship in our Chapters. Their work helps create opportunities that empower our brothers to grow, lead, and serve.

U SIG TAU LEADERSHIP FUND

This fund supports current-year programs such as Webb Academy, Noble Man Institute, and scholarships. Without donations to this fund, the Foundation would be unable to continue funding these programs. Supporting these funds allows the Foundation to support more members and to provide a unique and compelling member experience.

2 CHAPTER FUND

Donations to this fund directly benefit individual chapters. NON-CASH WAYS TO SUPPORT YOUR FOUNDATION

Transfer Stock

Donate appreciated stock directly to the Foundation to receive a tax deduction and avoid capital gains tax. If the stock has decreased in value, you may consider selling it first and then donating the proceeds to claim a charitable contribution deduction.

Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs)

At age 73, you must take yearly distributions from traditional IRAs and 401(k)s. You can have some or all of this sent directly to the Foundation, which lowers your taxable income

Inherited IRAs

These must be fully withdrawn within 10 years of inheritance, with rules similar to regular RMDs.

Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCDs)

If you are 70½ or older, you can give up to \$100,000 per year directly from your IRA without paying taxes on that amount.

Donor Advised Funds

Ask your fund administrator to send a donation from your donor advised fund to the Foundation.

The Foundation gladly accepts donations in cryptocurrency.

Garth Lampkin, Cleveland State, Beta Upsilon, '88, was the first to lend a hand, the first to join a committee, and passionate about his Fraternity. Garth loved Cleveland State and he loved Sigma Tau Gamma.

When Garth joined Sig Tau, his brothers knew he was quieter than most and that attending college was a major accomplishment for him. So when he decided to come out of his shell and join Sigma Tau Gamma, his parents were shocked. He had not even told them he was joining. He had not even told them he was joining, which came as a surprise when his parents showed up at the chapter house, worried because it was late and Garth had not come home.

That night, Garth's parents left the chapter house comforted, knowing he had found a home away from home, a brotherhood.

Garth's dedication to the Fraternity remained strong throughout his years as an alumnus. His commitment came with a special kind of dedication, the willingness to ride a bus to every Sig Tau experience he attended.

Still living in the Cleveland, Ohio area, Garth traveled by bus to Fraternity events far and wide. Some of his destinations included:

He didn't need to say much, and often he wouldn't, yet you always knew when he was in the room. His warm smile and the brotherhood he radiated made his presence unmistakable.

Choosing the bus for his travels, Garth never let distance keep him from his brothers. He was traveling to be with his brothers.

At Grand Conclave in Kansas City, Sigma Tau Gamma's Centennial celebration in 2022, Garth's absence was noticed. Word had spread that he was battling health issues. Garth was a kind and uplifting soul. He did not deserve to face cancer. No one does.

After his diagnosis and the loss of his independence, Garth was placed in a care facility that was substandard to say the least. Not wanting attention, Garth was quiet about his new life circumstances.

found was heartbreaking. Garth was unkempt, had not been moved from his bed for a long time, and was in a facility where care and concern for patients was not a priority. Beta Upsilon stepped in to provide what was missing.

Brothers quickly rallied to move Garth to a new facility, pay his back rent, and provide him with a working cell phone. At this stage in life, Garth no longer had any family left. Beta Upsilon made sure he did not feel alone.

In his final months, days, and moments leading up to his passing, Garth was surrounded by his brothers. Men traveled across the Midwest, including undergraduates from Beta Upsilon who had never met him, to make sure Garth felt the love of friendship and brotherhood. But Garth being Garth, he never wanted to talk about himself or his prognosis. He wanted to talk about Sigma Tau Gamma and share memories of the Fraternity.

Garth Jay Lampkin entered chapter eternal on December 31, 2024. While the brothers of Beta Upsilon finalize plans to memorialize him in the chapter house, his smile and presence will be remembered and missed at every national Fraternity program for years to come.

THE MILESTONE

In the heart of Tuscaloosa, a dream more than a decade in the making is finally becoming reality. The brothers of Sigma Tau Gamma's Epsilon Phi Chapter at the University of Alabama are preparing to move into their first permanent on-campus home—a milestone made possible by years of dedication, planning, brotherhood, and a partnership with WPN Housing Company.

For a chapter long defined by values, integrity, and growth, the new house is far more than a logistical upgrade—it's a defining moment.

FROM VISION TO MISSION

The idea of a permanent home had floated among alumni and undergraduates for years. In January 2022, the University informed the chapter that 521 Jefferson Avenue would soon be available, and vision turned into action.

By April 2022, Sigma Tau Gamma had successfully bid for the property—marking a turning point in chapter history.

FUNDRAISING & DESIGN


Initial cost projections topped \$6 million, with a required \$600,000 down payment. In May 2024, the chapter launched the Building Noble Generations Capital Campaign. Within five months, alumni, friends, and active members had raised over \$410,000. Strategic negotiations lowered the total cost to \$4.8 million, bringing the down payment to \$480,000.

In June 2024, WPN Property Accountant Aubre Champ and Sigma Tau Gamma CFO Angie Sanders conducted a detailed site visit, helping create the construction project list, design plan, and business proposal that sealed university approval.

By January 2025, the UA Board of Trustees formally approved the project. WPN Housing Company, Sigma Tau Gamma's national property management entity, guided the business plan, coordinated the financial strategy, and ensured the house would meet member needs.

The new home will feature study areas, communal living spaces, a chapter room, and a leadership office—all reflecting the mission:

BUILDING NOBLE GENERATIONS OF MEN.



CONSTRUCTION BEGINS

Construction began in May 2025, with completion set for August—just in time for the fall semester. Meanwhile, the chapter operates from its temporary home at 401 Jefferson Avenue, purchased in August 2023 as an interim base.

KYLE WIMBERLEY,SOUTHEASTERN LOUISIANA,

Before he stepped in front of a camera, Kyle Wimberley was just a hard worker with a normal nine to five. An alumnus of the Phi Chapter at Southeastern Louisiana, Kyle's story took a dramatic and unexpected turn in 2024 when he appeared on Netflix's Million Dollar Secret, a high stakes reality competition where deception, intuition, and social strategy collide.

Kyle's path to the screen wasn't traditional. It began back in 2019 when he and his best friend Brandon were organizing events in Louisiana at a southern mud park. That exposure led to a near casting on a Discovery Channel show, which didn't pan out, but the casting process stuck.

"After that, I'd get calls every 8–10 months for new shows. Most of them never happened." Kyle shared. Then in January 2024, while on his annual hunting trip, the phone rang again. "I ignored it at first, I was out in the woods. But after they reached out to my best friend, I finally called back."

This time, it was different. Days later, he was on a plane to Canada to film Million Dollar Secret. Kyle admits it didn't feel real until he stepped off the plane and saw someone holding a sign with his name.

"That's when I knew this was really happening."



Since the show aired, Kyle's life has taken a new trajectory. "I've received the kindest messages from people all over the world and it's been incredibly humbling." Opportunities have also emerged behind the scenes. "There are things in the works I can't talk about yet, but let's just say, you might see me on TV again." Kyle has maintained close relationships with several cast members, formed lasting friendships, and is excited for his next projects.

When asked what advice he'd give to current Sigma Tau Gamma undergraduates or alumni facing life's unexpected challenges, Kyle was clear:

TEACHING WITH PURPOSE

ELLIOT BECK, ARIZONA, Zeta Pi Chapter, '16





Elliot Beck, an alumnus of the Zeta Pi Chapter at the University of Arizona, has been named one of nine finalists for the University of Arizona Athletics' Teacher of the Year Award, an honor that reflects both his innovation in education and his deep commitment to student growth. For Elliot, the recognition is more than just professional validation as it is a personal milestone rooted in his college days.

"It felt like a full-circle moment. I remember attending basketball games with my Sig Tau brothers and watching teachers be recognized at halftime. I used to think, 'Maybe that'll be me one day,' but I assumed it would happen much later in my career. Being nominated just five years into teaching was incredibly fulfilling."

Initially unsure of his career path, Elliot found direction during his time at the University of Arizona and Sigma Tau Gamma played a key role. As a founding father of Zeta Pi Chapter, he helped establish the Fraternity on campus, an experience that would later impact his journey as an educator. "I wasn't even planning to join a fraternity, but Sig Tau offered the chance to build something new," he shared. "That experience of stepping into leadership and creating a meaningful community laid the foundation for who I am as a teacher."

During college, Elliot became involved in impactful service work, including organizing events for Special Olympics through his role as community service chair. That hands-on experience with students sparked an interest in teaching that soon became a calling. In the classroom, Elliot's approach to teaching is anything but traditional. His lessons are rooted in student empowerment.

One of his most talked-about features is his "Wall of Mathematicians", a wall in his classroom filled with mathematicians from diverse backgrounds, with a mirror placed in the center. "I want students to see that no matter who they are, they can do math. That mirror helps them see themselves as capable as part of that legacy."

Elliot took on another pioneering role this past summer to help launch a brand-new high school in his district focused on reimagining education. Just as he once helped establish a

fraternity chapter, he's now working to build a school culture grounded in innovation and inclusion. "Sig Tau shaped my understanding of leadership. Now, I'm helping build a school for students who may not feel like they fit into traditional models. It's all connected." For current undergraduates considering a future in education, Elliot offers encouragement:

"If you're passionate about teaching, pursue it. We need more dedicated educators. Take on leadership roles within your chapter as they'll prepare you more than you realize."

As he continues shaping students' futures and challenging norms in education, Elliot Beck stands as an example of how brotherhood, service, and innovation can create lasting impact, both in and beyond the classroom.




